
PENDERGRASS LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT 2018-2019

YEAR IN REVIEW

NARRATIVE

The 2018 – 2019 academic year was one of great transformation for Pendergrass, especially in the areas of library spaces and personnel. Our collaborative study space, computer lab, makerspaces, and staff spaces were all renovated during the summer of 2018. We also added some electrical to the quiet study area, upgraded the fire alarm system in the front portion of Pendergrass, and added stationary and mobile white boards. We welcomed our users into those spaces throughout the following year, learning about the successes of and areas of further need related to the renovation. Also during the 2018 – 2019 academic year, we onboarded Zoe Bastone and began preparing for the July 2020 retirement of Ann Viera. David Atkins departed UT Libraries in November 2018, and we welcomed Associate Dean Teresa Walker to a leadership position for Pendergrass. Sandy Leach also concluded her post-retirement appointment at Pendergrass in June 2019. Additional changes for Pendergrass included the launch of a new Pendergrass website and a merger of the Pendergrass social media accounts with those of UT Libraries. We also expanded our hours of operation, opening 3 hours earlier on Sunday mornings, based on a student's request and a pilot study of library usage during those hours. Pendergrass has continued to foster partnerships with and is host to various campus entities including the Writing Center, Multicultural Student Life tutoring, OIT statistical consultants, and Senior Vice President/Senior Vice Chancellor Tim Cross. We have also begun to explore the impacts and opportunities associated with the reunification of UTK and UTIA.

TEACHING, LEARNING, & INNOVATION

- Pendergrass, in partnership with OIT, conducted an audit of wireless access throughout Pendergrass, resulting in a wireless upgrade. (1.1.1)
- Librarians conducted numerous instruction sessions and consultations (see Departmental Statistics and Data below), including to classes and groups that have not previously engaged with instruction. Librarians also conducted assessments of instruction for continuous improvement. (1.1.2, 1.4)
- A Clue game was developed (in collaboration with Holly Dean and Allison Shepard) and tested for library orientation and information literacy instruction for ANSC 100. (1.1.2)
- Developed SLAs' Place, which is an online repository of tutorials, procedural guidelines, forms, and other information to aid our SLAs in their work (1.1.9, 4.1.7)
- Pendergrass completed over 200 3D printing requests (see Departmental Statistics and Data below), including class projects for Dr. Joshua Kenna's SSCE 599 and Dr. Eric Drumm's CSAS 270 classes. Pendergrass also 3D printed a collection of wildlife skulls for the UT Extension office in Morgan County, among numerous other projects that contributed to UT's land-grant mission of teaching, research, and extension. - Hosted poster design and printing workshops for EURēCA participants (1.2)
- Collaborated with other UT Libraries' faculty and staff to strengthen partnerships with area educators through the BOSS and EduBOSS programs (1.2.3)
- Hosted and promoted the Writing Center in Pendergrass, which offered specialized assistance for thesis and dissertation writers from UTIA and UTK, in addition to their other forms of writing assistance (1.3.2)
- Instruction librarians completed the Cultural Competency and Inclusive Teaching certificate. (1.4.5)
- Renovations to the collaborative study space, computer lab, makerspaces, and electrical were completed. (1.5.2)

- Hosted orientation sessions for Herbert College of Agriculture transfer students in Pendergrass, and participated in orientations for Herbert College of Agriculture freshmen (1.6.1)
- Began work on a curriculum mapping project to scaffold library instruction within the Herbert College of Agriculture (1.6.4)

EMPOWERING RESEARCH

- Heavily promoted the Mike Morrison approach to creating [better posters](#) (2.1)
- Informed researchers of various data services via displays, in-person contacts, and collaboration with Chris Eaker (2.1.5)
- Promoted open science by publicizing the documentary *Paywall: The Business of Scholarship* (2.4)
- Continued to advocate for the open dissemination of research, including open archiving and PeerJ (2.4.2, 2.4.5)

COLLABORATIVE COLLECTIONS

- Continued work on weeding the collection, focusing on the following areas: duplicates, SF600 – SF900, and leisure reading (3.2)
- Project Ceres was completed (in conjunction with Louisa Trott and Meredith Hale). This project included the digitization and preservation of serials from UT Extension and Experiment Station (now AgResearch), the promotion of three ensuing digital collections, and the creation of a bibliography of the serial publications from the Extension and Experiment Stations. (3.5.5)

ORGANIZATIONAL EXCELLENCE

- Hosted an open house for members of the UT Libraries, as well as tours for new Libraries employees and visits with colleagues in and outside the UT Libraries (4.2.5)
- Completed a renovation of the staff area, including offices, kitchenette, storage closet, and front desk (4.4.1)

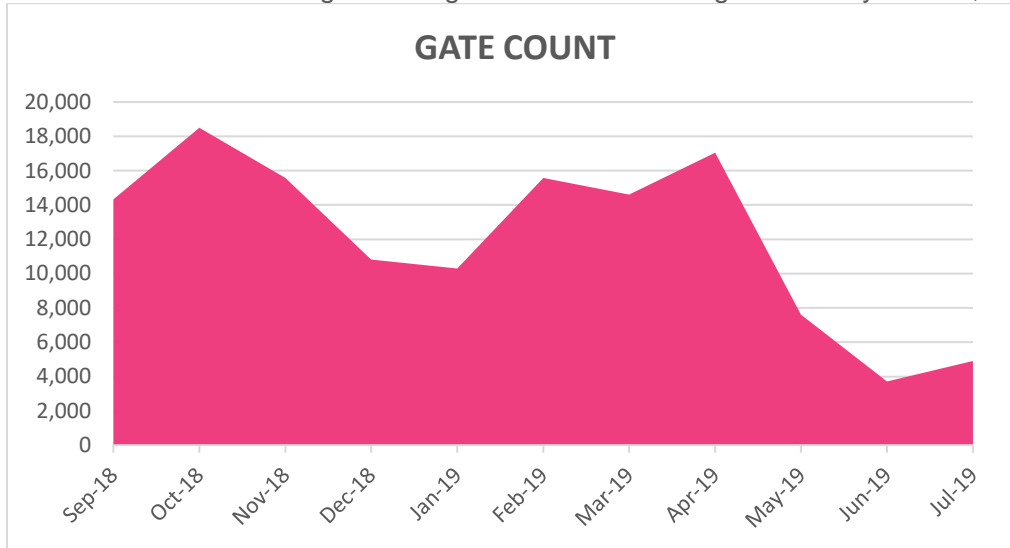
SHARING OUR STORY

- Contributed to VolVet News, the newsletter from the Veterinary Medical Center to referring veterinarians, via the “Check It Out: Helpful Information from Pendergrass Library” section (5.3)
- Organized and hosted the inaugural Syllabus Support Day, which gave instructors an opportunity to work on their syllabi in the library, as well as speak to representatives from Pendergrass, OIT, the Writing Center, and Student Disability Services. (5.3.1)
- Reinstated monthly Make Break sessions to promote and educate about 3D printing services (5.3.1)
- Obtained and promoted VetCompanion and Vetstream/Vetlexicon, which are evidence-based, point-of-care resources for 4th year veterinary medicine students and clinical faculty (5.3.3)
- Launched a Date with a Book promotion to publicize the leisure reading collection (5.3.3)
- Created an outreach plan to address anticipated outreach needs before, during, and after the construction of the College of Veterinary Medicine’s Teaching and Learning Center (5.3.7)
- Regularly held a pop-up library in Herbert College of Agriculture to spread awareness about Pendergrass Library’s resources and services (5.3.7)

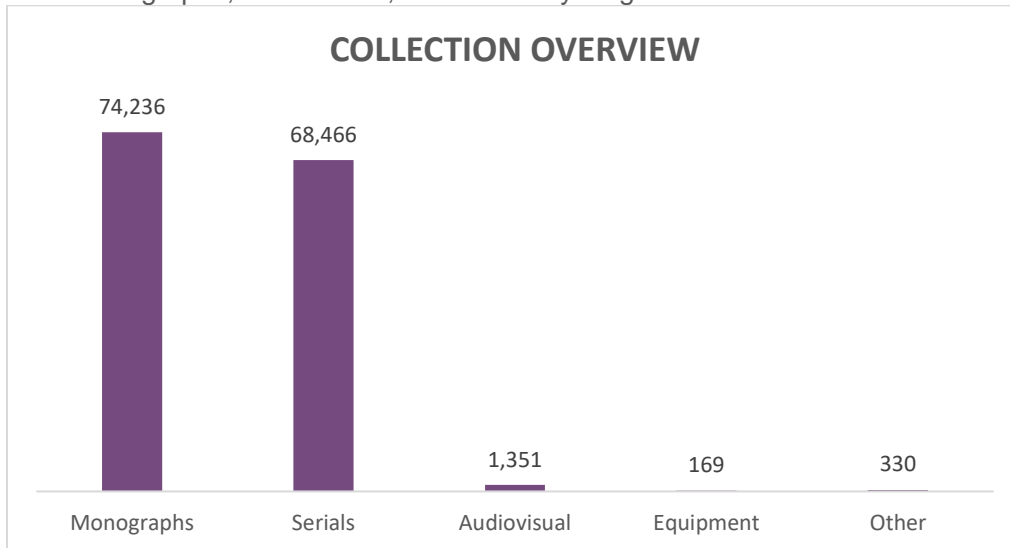
Gate count (9/1/18 – 7/31/19): 132,990

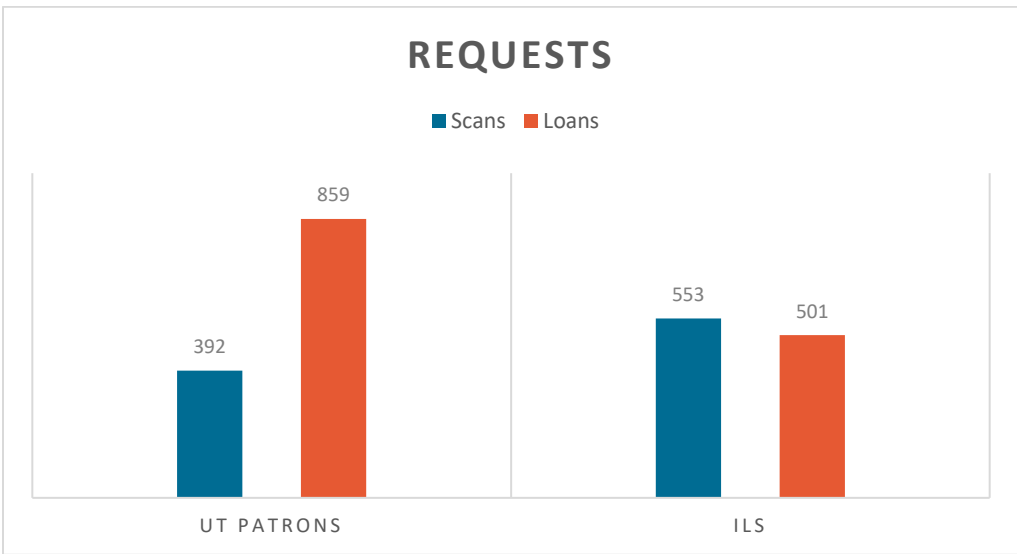
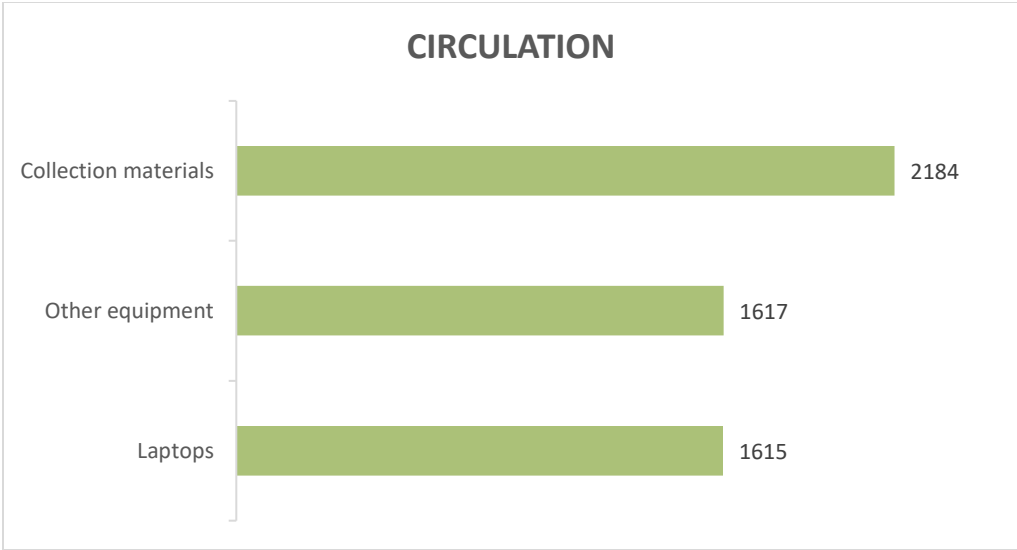
- Pendergrass Library was closed for renovation May – August 2018
- October 2018 was the largest-ever gate count for Pendergrass Library with 18,502 visitors



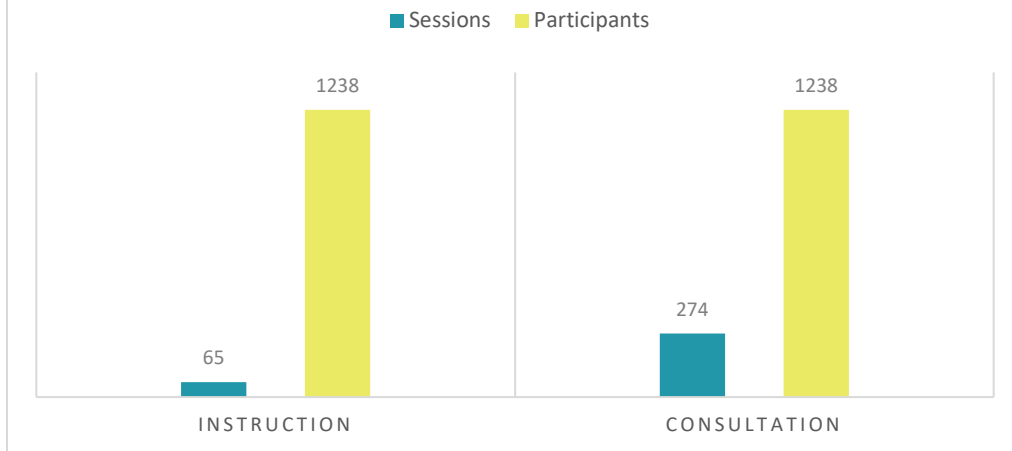
Collections

- 51% monographs, 47% serials, and 2% everything else

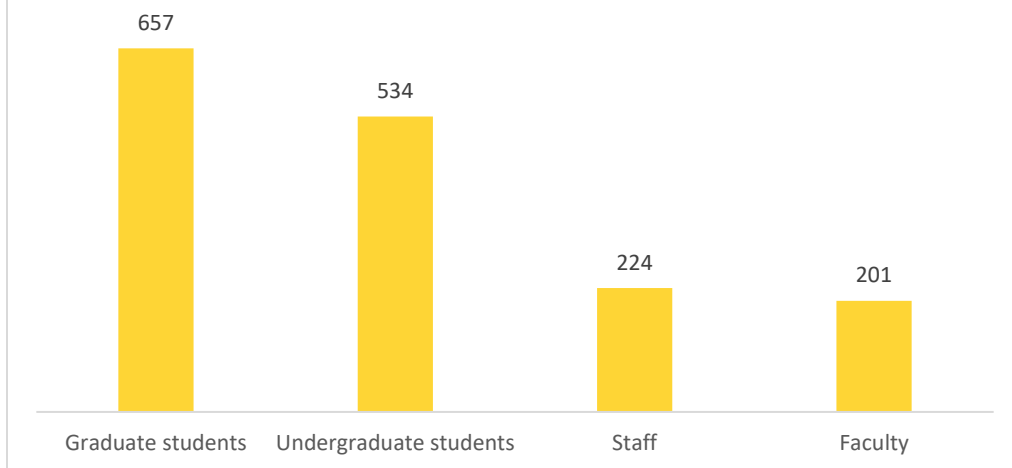


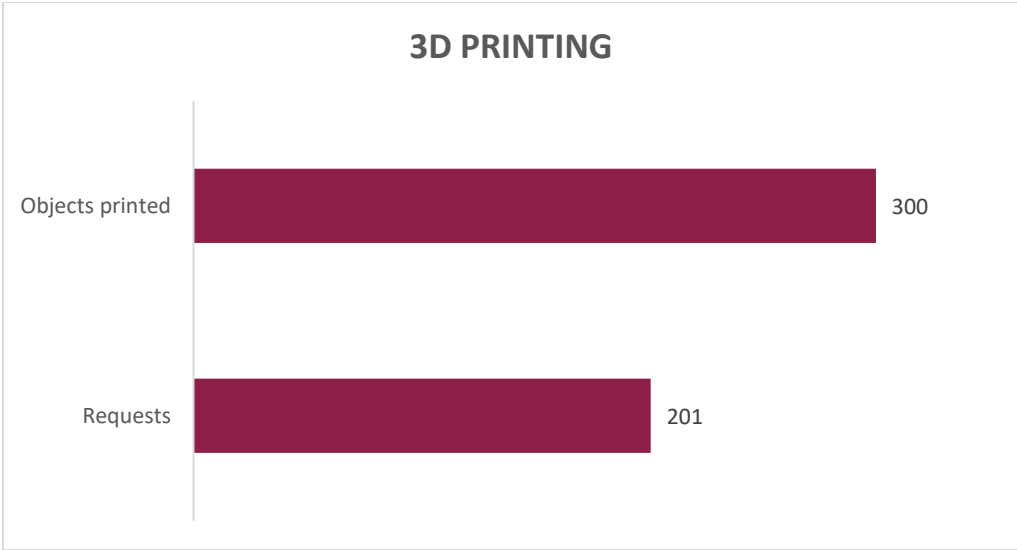

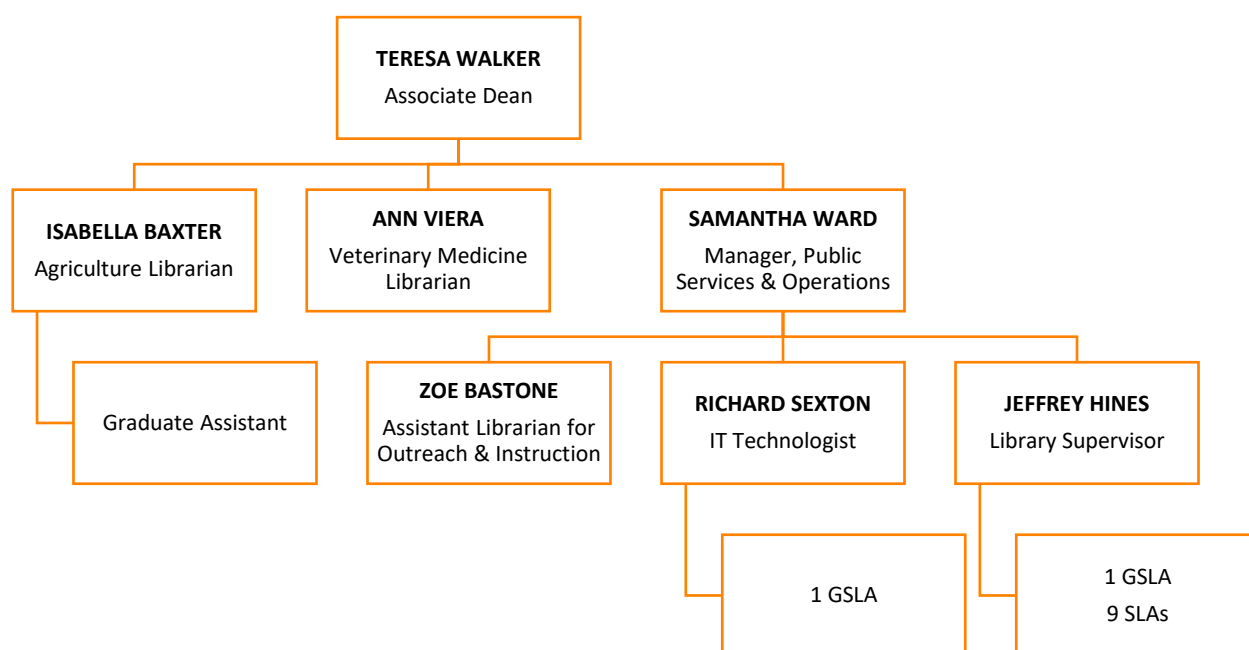
